#### TOWNSHIP OF CRANBURY ORDINANCE NO. 11-19-15

# AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING SUMP PUMP AND MECHANICAL WATER DISCHARGE REGULATIONS

**WHEREAS**, water discharged from sump pumps onto sidewalks, roads, and impermeable surfaces, particularly in winter when it can freeze, creates a hazard to pedestrians and motorists; and

**WHEREAS**, the Township seeks to ensure the proper management of discharge and flow from sump pumps, to provide for enforcement, and thereby to protect the public health, safety and welfare of its residents;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED AND ENACTED**, by the Township Committee of the Township of Cranbury, Middlesex County, New Jersey as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> There is hereby created a new Chapter 132 entitled "Sump Pump Discharge," which reads as follows:

## § 132-1 Sump Pump Discharge

- A. There shall be no sump pump discharges or mechanical discharge of any stormwater directly onto any Township street or sidewalk, into the sanitary sewer, or directly into any public drywell.
- B. The sump pump or mechanical discharge of any stormwater shall be discharged into any of the following:
  - (1) An established watercourse;
  - (2) A natural drainage course, only where an established watercourse is not available; or
  - (3) A yard, only if such yard is capable of absorbing the discharge without creating stagnant water pools; or
  - (4) A drywell or gravel infiltration trench located on the property owner's property.

# § 132-2 Definitions

As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

#### ESTABLISHED WATERCOURSE

A man-made condition of the land constructed for the purpose of receiving and transporting surface water runoff. Concave depressions or slopes forming street gutters along curbs shall be considered "established watercourses."

#### NATURAL WATERCOURSE

A natural condition of the land which serves as a runoff for surface waters.

# § 132-3 Timing

Any occupant, owner or tenant who currently releases sump pump or mechanical water discharge onto public streets or sidewalks shall become compliant with this Ordinance by July 1, 2020.

#### § 132-4 Applicability

This chapter is applicable to all sump pump mechanical water discharging, whether by a private person or public entity and whether discharged from private or public property.

#### § 132-5 Enforcement

Enforcement of this provision shall begin on July 1, 2020. This chapter shall be enforced by the Township Code Enforcement Officer. All properties shall be inspected at the time of sale to ensure compliance with this Chapter.

# § 132-6 Violations and Penalties

Any owner, occupant or tenant violating any provision of this article shall be liable for the penalties established in Chapter 1, § 1-15 of this Code, entitled "General penalty; continuing violations," except that no person found to have violated a provision of this article shall be subject to imprisonment for such violation.

<u>Section 2.</u> Repealer. All ordinances or Code provisions or parts thereof inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

<u>Section 3.</u> Severability. Each section, subsection, sentence, clause and phrase of this Ordinance is declared to be an independent section, subsection, sentence, clause and phrase, and the finding or holding of any Court of competent jurisdiction that any such portion of this Ordinance is un-Constitutional, void or ineffective for any cause or reason shall not affect any other portion of this Ordinance.

Section 4. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and publication.

# Public Comment -

Mayor Taylor opened the meeting to general public comment.

- Richard Kallan Mr. Kallan presented a cost analysis he prepared regarding Petty Road
  residents and paying for the road improvements through a 10-year bond as opposed to the
  agreement with Toll Bros. Discussion ensued from the committee regarding the various items
  that would be needed if a 10-year bond were to replace the agreement, such as, the need to
  obtain easements and the possible condemnation of properties. The members also explained
  the duration of time and substantial additional time it would add to the process. It was explained
  that a bond could possibly add 3-5 years to the completion of the roadway.
- Tom Macallister Cranbury Little League Requesting reimbursement for work done at the baseball fields/batting cages and for the purchase of foul ball netting. Ms. Marabello advised him to send the invoices to the Recreation Department for approval and reimbursement. Mr. Johnson reminded all that no one person should authorize work on parks. The process should be adhered to so that approvals are received prior to work being done and done within the proper parameters.

 Bill Bauder – Mr. Bauder questioned if all residents received the recent newsletter. Ms. Marabello responded that they were sent along with the sewer bills recently and mailed to those on septic. He stated that he completely disagrees with the decision to not widen Petty Road. He believes the current plan for improvement will not withstand the current wear and tear from traffic.

Mayor Taylor closed the meeting to public comment.
