Mayor Stout reported he will attend the New Jersey Conference of Mayors meeting on Wednesday and Thursday and hopefully hear some updates concerning COAH and Governor Christie's speech on "the State's Financial Health".

--Members of Committee

Mr. Cook reported there are comments being circulated concerning the definition of a municipality being "compliant" in regard to Senate Bill-1 vs. being compliant per the Task Force. With S-1 a Township would be compliant with 7.5% of its total housing inventory for affordable housing. The rumor was it is 20%. Mr. Cook reported the figure only applies to new residential housing developments. Mr. Cook stated the hope is the two (2) parties will reach a "a happy medium".

Reports and Communications --Members of Committee

Mr. Cook also reported on solid waste disposal. He stated the Township is in the process of entertaining proposals on what a municipality can look for as far as a contractual agreement with a company as opposed to individual residents paying. Mr. Cook reported by the end of the year the Township determine if it wishes to pursue it and will hold informational presentations from companies for the public.

Mr. Cody reported the Township officially had been certified by COAH last week.

Mr. Cody indicated he had a few reports from Mr. Taylor, who is absent this meeting:

Mr. Cody (on behalf of Mr. Taylor) indicated the proposal for the sidewalk at the Police Station will be \$7,400 as opposed to \$16,000 as had been budgeted. Mr. Cody (on behalf of Mr. Taylor) also reported the Public Work's building bathroom is being fixed by at a price under \$17,500 and includes a full re-model. Ms. Smeltzer, Township Administrator, has photos of the damage if anyone should wish to look at them.

Section 4. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer; provided that no note shall mature later than one year from its date. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the chief financial officer. The chief financial officer shall determine all matters in connection with notes issued pursuant to this ordinance, and the chief financial officer's signature upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of the Local Bond Law. The chief financial officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The chief financial officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the notes pursuant to this ordinance is made. Such report must include the amount, the description, the interest rate and the maturity schedule of the notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.

Section 5. The Township hereby certifies that it has adopted a capital budget or a temporary capital budget, as applicable. The capital or temporary capital budget of the Township is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. To the extent that the purposes authorized herein are inconsistent with the adopted capital or temporary capital budget, a revised capital or temporary capital budget has been filed with the Division of Local Government Services.

Section 6. Any grant moneys received for the purpose described in Section 3 hereof shall be applied either to direct payment of the cost of the improvement or to payment of the obligations issued pursuant to this ordinance. The amount of obligations authorized but not issued hereunder shall be reduced to the extent that such funds are so used.

Section 7. The chief financial officer of the Township is hereby authorized to prepare and to update from time to time as necessary a financial disclosure document to be distributed in connection with the sale of obligations of the Township and to execute such disclosure document on behalf of the Township. The chief financial officer is further authorized to enter into the appropriate undertaking to provide secondary market disclosure on behalf of the Township pursuant to Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission (the "Rule") for the benefit of holders and beneficial owners of obligations of the Township and to amend such undertaking from time to time in connection with any change in law, or interpretation thereof, provided such undertaking is and continues to be, in the opinion of a nationally recognized bond counsel, consistent with the requirements of the Rule. In the event that the Township fails to comply with its undertaking, the Township shall not be liable for any monetary damages, and the remedy shall be limited to specific performance of the undertaking.

Section 8. The full faith and credit of the Township are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Township, and the Township shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable real property within the Township for the payment of the obligations and the interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

He stated he would speculate the Township of Cranbury will come up with something similar. Mayor Stout responded is not the intent of the Township to do so and the update is to the Township's existing Master Plan. The Township will be looking at the viability of the downtown area as it is currently planned and zoned. Also areas that will be looked at are East of Route 130 and the Route 130 corridor. There is no intent to establish a retail zone. Mr. Cook added retail is a component of the update. Mr. Cody reported there have already been meetings for public input. Mr. MacDonald stated America used to be 40% industrial and now is 2% industrial. Mr. MacDonald asked how much of the items listed to be repaired in Ordinance # 04-10-04 are going to be performed by the Township's Public Work's Department and what percentage of items that need to be re-built are going to be done by a public contractor. Mayor Stout explained the Township has a pretty active Public Works Department however they are not going to perform the repairs on the building. Mr. MacDonald asked if the Township hires a public contractor is it going to pay them the prevailing wage as State law requires. Mayor Stout responded the Township is bound by State law to do so. Mr. MacDonald stated the Township is then forced by State law to hunt around for the highest labor. Ms. Smeltzer added when the Township reaches a certain threshold, it is required to pay the prevailing wage. Mr. Stannard stated the Township is required, under the State law, to put a job over a certain amount out to bid and then to accept the most responsible lowest bidder. Mr. Stannard stated, with all due respect, this is not the appropriate

forum to speak on the subjects he is referring to; the present discussion is on the ordinance to update the Master Plan. WHEREAS, it is the policy of the Township of Cranbury to treat the public, employees, prospective employees, appointees, volunteers and contractors in a manner consistent with all applicable civil rights law as and regulations including, but not limited to the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 as subsequently amended, the New Jersey Law Against Discrimination, the Americans with Disabilities Act and the Conscientious Employee Protection Act, and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the Township of Cranbury has determined that certain procedures need to be established to accomplish this policy.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ADOPTED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Cranbury that:

Cranbury Township Resolution # R 04-10-063 (Continued)

Section 1: No official, employee, appointee or volunteer of the Township of Cranbury by whatever title known, or any entity that is in any way a part of the Township of Cranbury shall engage, either directly or indirectly in any act including the failure to act that constitutes discrimination, harassment or a violation of any person's constitutional rights while such official, employee, appointee, volunteer or entity is engaged in or acting on behalf of the Township of Cranbury business or using the facilities or property of the Township of Cranbury.

Section 2: The prohibitions and requirements of this Resolution shall extend to any person or entity, including but not limited to any volunteer organization or inter-local organization, whether structured as a governmental entity or a private entity, that receives authorization or support in any way from the Township of Cranbury to provide services that otherwise could be performed by the Township of Cranbury.

Section 3: Discrimination, harassment and civil rights shall be defined for purposes of this Resolution using the latest definitions contained in the applicable Federal and State laws concerning discrimination, harassment and civil rights.

Section 4: The Administrator shall establish written procedure for any person to report alleged discrimination, harassment and violations of civil rights prohibited by this Resolution. Such procedures shall include alternate ways to report a complaint so that the person making the complaint need not communicate with the alleged violator in the event the alleged violator would be the normal contact for such complaints.

Section 5: No person shall retaliate against any person who reports any alleged discrimination, harassment or violation of civil rights, provided, however, that the person who reports alleged violations in bad faith shall be subject to appropriate discipline.

Section 6: The Township Committee of the Township of Cranbury shall establish written procedures that require all officials, employees, appointees and volunteers of the Township of Cranbury as well as other entities subject to this Resolution to periodically complete training concerning their duties, responsibilities and rights pursuant to this Resolution.

Section 7: The Township Administrator of the Township of Cranbury shall report at least annually to the governing body the results of the monitoring.

Section 8: At least annually, the Township Committee of the Township of Cranbury shall cause a summary of this Resolution and the procedures established pursuant to this Resolution to be communicated within the Township. This communication shall include a statement from the governing body expressing its unequivocal commitment to enforce this Resolution. This summary shall also be posted on the Township's web site.

Section 9: This Resolution shall take effect immediately.

WHEREAS, to address the ever-increasing demand for the use of Cranbury Township's playing fields (including soccer, lacrosse and field hockey fields, softball fields, and baseball fields), the Cranbury Township Recreation Commission has recommended that the Township establish a priority list and fee structure for the reservation and use of Cranbury's playing fields; and

WHEREAS, under the regulations promulgated by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, Green Acres Program, N.J.A.C. 7:36-25.11, municipalities may adopt fees and schedule the use of their recreation facilities on unfunded parkland at their discretion; and

WHEREAS, all of Cranbury's playing fields are located on unfunded parkland; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 108 of the Code of the Township of Cranbury ("Code") authorizes Township Committee to establish by resolution the usage rules and fee schedule applicable to each of the Township's athletic fields; and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee has reviewed the recommendations of the Recreation Commission and seeks to establish rules and regulations and a fee structure for the use of the Township's athletic fields consistent with the Recreation Commission's recommendations;

A RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE TOWNSHIP OF CRANBURY'S REQUEST TO THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX TO LOWER THE SPEED LIMIT ALONG OLD TRENTON ROAD

WHEREAS, Old Trenton Road, also known as County Route 535, extends through the Township of Cranbury from the Township's border with East Windsor Township, Mercer County, in northeasterly direction to its intersection with South Main Street; and

WHEREAS, along this stretch of road, Old Trenton Road is bordered by residential neighborhoods, single family homes and recreational facilities such as Millstone Park and the Cranbury Swim Club; and

WHEREAS, the roadway is currently a 50 MPH road based on a statuary speed limit for road ways in a rural area; and

WHEREAS, the character of the area adjacent to the road has changed over the years to be of a more suburban residential character as defined in the Title 39 Motor Vehicles and Traffic Regulation; and

WHEREAS, Title 39 Motor Vehicles and Traffic Regulations allows for the posting of roads exhibiting this character at a statutory 35 MPH; and

WHEREAS, the Township Engineer is of the opinion that the roadway meets the tests for a suburban residential road and recommends the posting of a speed limit of 35 MPH.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Cranbury, in the County of Middlesex, as follows:

1. The Township hereby requests and petitions the County of Middlesex to post Old Trenton Road (a/k/a/ County Route 535), from the Township's border with East Windsor Township, Mercer County, to South Main Street, as a 35 mile per hour road in accordance with Title 39 Motor Vehicles and Traffic Regulation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Township, appreciates the efforts and assistance of the County of Middlesex and especially the Office of the County Engineer in helping to resolve this issue.

Reports from Township Staff and Professionals

Ms. Cunningham, Clerk, announced she had attended the County Clerk's Meeting recently and was informed there were grant monies available under the "Help America Vote Act" (HAVA). Ms. Cunningham applied to furnish the two (2) outside staircases leading to the Senior Room and Boy Scout Room with one (1) handrail each. The costs will be \$1,800 and will be completely covered by the grant with no cost to the Township.

Mayor Stout reported the Township Attorney is not present this evening as the Township has instituted a recent policy concerning the Attorney's presence at meetings. If, after reviewing the upcoming Agenda, if there are not any issues requiring the Township Attorney's presence, it saves the Township from having to pay for her to be at the meetings. Mayor Stout added she will be at some meetings however, not at all the Township Committee meetings.

Work Session

a). <u>Presentation by Mr. Steven Fittante, Middlesex County on new "M6</u> Jamesburg, Cranbury, Plainsboro Community Shuttle".

Mr. Steven Fittante, Middlesex County Transportation Director, presented and discussed with the Township Committee and the public, the new "M6 Shuttle Service" which will be available to the residents starting on Saturday, May 15, 2010. Mr. Fittante stated the bus service will start in Jamesburg, continue to Monroe Township, Plainsboro and Cranbury and finally will end at the Princeton Junction Train Station during the hours of 6:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. In addition the bus service will be provided to stop at the new development of the University Medical Center at Plainsboro as well as the development of the Village area in Plainsboro. Mr. Fittante reported they will be providing direct service to Park Place (Senior Housing) and serving the general public and will operate six (6) days a week. The system will operate on a flag stop basis. The bus driver will pull over on North Main Street wherever it is safe to do so. Mr. Fittante indicated it is up to the Township to designate bus stops along North Main Street should it desire. Mr. Cook asked if this will be a pilot program. Mr. Fittante indicated the first five routes are for five (5) years and felt the opening of the new hospital next year will help the service to continue. Mayor Stout asked if there is some type of announcement that the Township can post on its web site. Mr. Fittante also reported any residential deviation would have to be scheduled 24 hours ahead.

Work Session (Continued)

b). <u>Discussion of Cranbury Township's Possible Participation in the Preservation of the</u> <u>"Kurek Farm"</u>

The Township Committee discussed the Township's possible participation in a farmland preservation application to the Middlesex County Agriculture Development Board for the Kurek Farm. Ms. Smeltzer reported the Township Committee had asked she find out what time frame there was for the Township Committee to make its decision. Ms. Smeltzer stated the County had not had the appraisal done yet. Mr. Cook stated it is his understanding the County will be paying for the appraisal and asked for the Ms. Smeltzer to check on the appraisal. Mayor Stout asked Ms. Smeltzer to convey to the County the Township Committee would like to continue discussions with the County and the landowner. Mayor Stout recommended forming a subcommittee to keep the dialogue going on the issue. The subcommittee will consist of Mr. Taylor and Mr. Cook and will be known as "the Kurek subcommittee".

Reports from Township Boards and Commissions

Ms. Cunningham, Clerk, announced the Annual Report from the Shade Tree Commission has been received.

Ms. Kirstie Venanzi, President, Library Board of Directors, reported she and Frank Marlowe, Library Board Member had met with Assemblywoman Linda Greenstein to raise their concern with the present legislation concerning libraries and the funding cuts recently made by the Governor. Assemblywoman Greenstein was very receptive to their concerns and proposed a meeting with Pat Tumulty, President, New Jersey Library Association as well as Norma Blake from the State Library.

Marilynn Mullen, Director of The Cranbury Public Library, gave the Library's Annual Report. Ms. Mullen reported more than 65,000 people came through the Library door last year and checked out over 50,000 items and the Library Staff answered over 6,600 questions. In addition, 5,000 people attended the Library's 260 programs. Ms. Mullen reported the Library starts educating children almost at birth. The Library's "Toddler Time" is introduction to the Library with both books and music. The children then graduate to "Pre-School Story Time" and other childrens' programs. Last year the Summer Reading Program had over 300 participants reading over 4,000 hours. During the school year, the Library provides children in grades K-12 with reading materials for class and school projects. Ms. Mullen stated less than 2% of a household's taxes go to support a Library which amounts to \$175.00 per year for the average Cranbury home. Ms. Mullen reported in 2009 the Library received a grant to provide services to the autistic community. They offered seminars and conducted programs for autistic adults. A defiblator was purchased for the Library and provided CPR Training for all staff members. Cranbury Library placed in the top 5% of small American libraries for 2009. Staffer Doug Baldwin placed third in the New Jersey State Library Video Contest, "Solving Life's Problems" showing two residents how to use the internet to "find a companion" through a dating service. Ms. Mullen distributed to the Township Committee a summary of the Library's expenses for the last five (5) years. Mayor Stout thanked Ms. Mullen for a "very thorough analysis" and asked to have it available to the public. Mr. Cook stated as a resident of Cranbury Township he has always utilized the Library's services and thanked Ms. Mullen for the Library getting involved in the town as well a providing its resources to residents.

Report from Chairperson Beth Veghte, Board of Recreation Commissioners on outstanding baseball field items.

Ms. Beth Veghte, Board of Recreation Commissioners discussed with the Township Committee members the new baseball field items that need to be acquired. Ms. Veghte reported former Mayor Pari Stave helped the Township get a \$175,000 grant for the field. Ms. Veghte reported Jeff Graydon, Director of Fields, Bill Tanner, Township Engineer, Ken Jacobs, Recreation

Reports from Township Boards and Commissions (Continued) Ms. Beth Veghte, Report on Baseball field items (cont'd)

Director and Greg Farrington, Construction Official worked on obtaining guotes for the necessary items for the ball field. Mr. Cody explained this is known as "Phase II" of the project. Ms. Veghte reported years ago there was a committee that wanted the baseball field to fit in with the neighboring farm land. At the time, the committee looked at having dugouts which resembled corn cribs. In speaking with Jeff Graydon and Bill Tanner, they indicated that particular design was not the best idea as they are made of wood which would not be durable. Mr. Cody added those types of dugouts are prone to vandalism and the metal roof on the corn crib dugout would be like a heater for the team. Ms. Veghte reported the decision was made to go with fencing similar to what is presently around the outfield and to surround the fencing with wind blocks which is a fabric stretched all the way around and it is about three (3) feet wide. It can be taken down in the winter time. Ms. Veghte reported this is a much more cost-effective way to go. The fencing for the dugouts is about \$10,000. Ms. Veghte reported the dugouts will be approximately 42' in length. Mayor Stout suggested the subcommittee order "equipment bag racks" as the children usually hang their bags on the fence and it can be a problem and as long as the Township is buying a bat and helmet rack, they should purchase an equipment bag rack. Ms. Veghte reported the total cost for the dugout will be approximately \$23,000.

Ms. Veghte reported a solar-powered scoreboard will be very cost effective and will cost approximately \$10,000. The solar scoreboard comes with backup batteries and costs \$10/year to run. If it is electric power, it will run about \$20,000.

Ms. Veghte reported the subcommittee will be purchasing two (2) sets of aluminum bleachers and will be installed on concrete slabs. The bleachers will hold approximately 50 people each. Also, one bleacher will come with two (2) cutouts in the front for the handicapped, or they can order the bleachers and extend the concrete slab out to accommodate the handicapped. The total cost for the bleachers will be approximately \$22,000.

Ms. Veghte reported the subcommittee checked on installation of a well to irrigate the baseball field as well as a tie-in line for the irrigation of the soccer fields which are located on the school property. The approximate cost if the Township ties into the school's line will be approximately \$25,000. Ms. Veghte stated Ken Jacobs, Recreation Director and Greg Farrington, Construction Official, will oversee the purchasing of the items.

Ms. Veghte and Mr. Cody asked the Township Committee to approve the items. A motion by was by Mr. Cook, seconded by Mr. Stannard and unanimously carried, to approve the recommended items as presented by the baseball subcommittee:

Public Comment

The Mayor opened the meeting to public questions and comment. Mr. Richard Kallan, 10 Wynnewood Drive, stated his opposition to purchasing a \$10,000 scoreboard and suggested a chalk board be used instead. Mr. Bruce MacDonald, Hamilton Township, reported at Veterans Park the Township recently approved \$200,000 to upgrade the flood lights on the soccer fields at

Veterans Park and urged the Township not to do the same with the baseball field. Mr. MacDonald also asked why the Kurek farm is being sold and why the County wants the Township to participate. He suggested having the owner just sell the farm. Mayor Stout responded it will be deed restricted so it cannot be developed. The easement will be for agricultural use only and the long-term economics are attractive. Mr. Dan Mulligan, Old Cranbury Road, asked of the \$175,000, what amount is being spent for the items for the baseball field. Mayor Stout responded \$86,000. Ms. Beth Veghte, Bunker Hill, stated she recently had to park behind Teddy's Restaurant and the parking lot at the Senior Housing does not have a "curb cut". Anyone handicapped has to walk into the road in order to get to the one road and suggested someone investigate. Mayor Stout responded he will send Mr. Thorne. Public Works Director, out to look at it. Ms. Veghte also asked when the issue of the center medians on Old Trenton Road are going to be addressed. Mayor Stout responded the driveway at Millstone Park will be re-aligned and left-hand turn lanes will be installed. Ms. Veghte raised her concern some of the parking spaces on the road will be eliminated and Mr. Stout indicated some will. Her suggestion is to make the parking lot larger at Millstone Park as whenever there is a baseball or soccer game there are at least ten (10) cars parked on the road. Mr. Cook indicated he will speak with Mr. Tanner, Township Engineer and they will work to resolve the issue. Ms. Connie Bauder, Petty Road, spoke against municipal garbage service. Ms. Bauder reported she had read recently in the paper municipalities that have provided the service are now sorry. She referenced the Township having three (3) companies providing service and residents are signing three (3) year contracts now with those companies and there are other items the Township needs to spend its time on. Mr. Richard Kallan, 10 Wynnewood Drive, stated he used to have Midco who recently raised their fee. He changed to a new company for one (1) year at \$25/month (with a 95 gallon container) and is saving approximately \$250 per year. Mr. Kallan suggested the Township investigate the company to see how much they would charge the Township. Mr. Cook added the Township will have a referendum on the ballot in November to ascertain the sentiments of the residents. Mr. Bruce MacDonald, Hamilton Township, reported half of New York City's garbage is recyclables. Hamilton Township provides garbage pick-up as part of residents' taxes. However there is so much vegetation thrown out with the trash it is becoming a problem and suggested having two (2) days of collection; one (1) day for vegetation and the other for recyclable items. There being no further comments, the Mayor closed the public part of the meeting.
