Reports and Communications

--Mayor

Mayor Stout reported the Township Committee received a letter from State Senator Raymond Lesniak regarding COAH, and he has asked for feedback concerning if the Township would still want to move forward to its Regional Contribution Agreements. Mayor Stout indicated that the Township Committee can discuss this during its work session.

Mayor Stout reported there has been correspondence back and forth between Middlesex County and the State Department of Environmental Protection concerning the area near the Brainerd Dam and the cleanup of the concrete. Mayor Stout stated the Township should see some plans from the County shortly.

Mr. Cook reported the letter from Senator Lesniak regarding COAH is creating a lot of interest "on all fronts" and he will keep the Township informed. Mr. Cook also reported he plans to attend the committee meeting in Trenton on February 1st which is open to the public. The committee vote is expected to take place on the bill around the 8th of March.

Mr. Cody urged the public not to misread the bill by thinking it will abolish the affordable housing plan in New Jersey. The bill, if enacted, will do away with COAH as it is known now.

a) <u>Discussion by Township Committee on the "Turnpike Tree Subcommittee's"</u> <u>Recommendations.</u>

Mayor Stout led the discussion explaining there are two types of mitigation that are owed to the Township due to the Turnpike widening project. Under the Flood Hazard Control Act anytime construction encroaches upon a stream and a bridge is built or widened, vegetative communities are impacted. Whenever a State Agency (Turnpike) undertakes a project that causes a loss of trees (deforestation), they have to replace under the "Net Loss Reforestation Act". Mr. Wahlers has headed up a subcommittee to recommend where the Township may want to place the 9,800 trees that will become available to the Township. The Turnpike has to replace 207 trees for each acre it takes from the Township, East Windsor Township has a letter of intent for 17,000 trees and plans to ask for more. Mayor Stout reported the Turnpike will give the Township \$ 300.00 to purchase and install each tree and will insure the trees' survival for a period of two (2) vears, Mr. Craig Hanlon, Principal Environmental Scientist from the Louis Berger Group. Inc. gave the background on the "No Net Loss Reforestation Act". He explained the trees have to be planted on 1/2 acre on a one-to-one ratio on State lands or public lands within the municipality first, or if there is no land within a municipality, then the trees would go to an adjoining municipality or state wide. Mr. Hanlon reported within the Township there is approximately 50 acres of deforestation. Of those 50 acres, the Turnpike will plant on two (2) acres of its own property thus leaving 48 acres within Cranbury to be planted. The trees need to be planted on property having public access such as schools, open space, green acres, etc. and not private lands. Mr. Hanlon stated the deadline is next month to have the plan submitted to the Turnpike as to how many trees and the locations where they will be planted. Mayor Stout reviewed the recommendation of the subcommittee stating the first site is on the Fischer property which is owned by the Township and on the Township's Recreation Open Space Inventory ("ROSI") listed as funded park land. Presently part of the land is being farmed, which is contrary to what the land was purchased for. The subcommittee has recommended planting 5,000 trees on the site. The Hagerty property which is opposite (across from the Fischer site) is a 20 acre parcel and the subcommittee has recommended planting 204 trees on it. The subcommittee recommended no additional trees on the "Pin Oak" site. The Updike

property has a parcel of 30+ acres which is also on the Township's ROSI, and if at some point this is to be used for recreational purposes, an agreement exists for a "windbreak" to be planted as a buffer to separate the homes from the open space. The Cranbury Brook Preserve was recommended to have 50 trees and Wright South to have 27 trees. Mayor Stout asked if the Board of Education has gotten back to the subcommittee as to how many trees they may want. Mr. Wahlers indicated he will follow up with the School as he has not heard back from them yet. The subcommittee recommended placing 112 trees on the Route 130-D property, 15 trees in Village Park, Old Trenton Road extension-16 trees, and along village streets and roads, 50 trees to replace diseased trees. Trees on sections of Liberty Road that have already been built - 202 trees (where the Township has the right-of-way). Mr. Wahlers reported there are a total of 6,500 trees. Mr. Hanlon indicated the Township can plant trees at additional locations (16 acres to use up the total 9,800 trees the Township can be given) should it desire to do so as long as it is on public lands. Mr. Cook recommended finding the additional 16 acres to make up the total. Mr. Cook recommended only reforesting a portion of the Fischer property and suggested Hagerty be completely reforested and asked how many trees would be used. Mr. Wahlers reported 4,000+ trees. Mr. Stannard urged the Township not to take trees just for the purpose of taking trees. Mayor Stout opened the discussion for public comment. Mr. Brian Schilling, Holmes Road, read a letter from his neighbors, Mary and Thomas Reilly, requesting trees be planted behind Route 130 at Cranbury Estates to act as a buffer to the highway, and Mr. Schilling urged the Township to still keep some of its agriculturally used land. Mr. Dale Smith, 8 Maplewood Avenue, asked if the Township signs a "letter of intent" and then decides not to plant trees in certain locations, is there a penalty. Mr. Hanlon responded he would have to check with D.E.P. Mr. Smith stated he feels it is more important for Cranbury to maintain its "view shed" of open space rather than plant a lot of trees on those particular parcels. Ms. Connie Bauder, Petty Road, congratulated the subcommittee for doing an outstanding job and spoke in favor of foresting Fischer and raised her concern about the wetlands on the property and the effects of the chemicals being used for the farming. Ms. Bauder recommended planting some trees along Petty, Old Trenton and Plainsboro Roads as this area is very windy and trees will help keep soils from blowing away. She also stated she is in favor of planting trees as a buffer on the Updike parcel. Mr. Dave Mauger, 26 Griggs Road, stated he is in favor of trees on Plainsboro Road and also in favor of trees buffering Route 130 (at the end of Rvan Road to act as a buffer to Route 130 due to truck traffic noise). Mr. Dan Mulligan, Old Cranbury Road, requested the Township keep a nice balance by allowing farming to continue on the Fischer property. Mr. Mulligan reported he heard many years ago the Fischer property was the site of one of the first Baptist Churches in the area. He suggested putting a community garden on a portion of Fischer and plant trees on the Hagerty property or possibly farming the Hagerty property. Ms. Barbara Rogers, member of the tree subcommittee, stated the intent of the subcommittee's plan is to reforest and not just "piecemeal" the planting of trees at various sites throughout the Township. Ms. Joan Smith, 8 Maplewood Avenue, stated the Township should leave its options open for a little while longer and commented that Cranbury has always been known for its beautiful open vistas. Ms. Norma Swale, Ryan Road, stated the Hagerty property needs to be cut every two (2) years and spoke in favor of having a meadow on the site. Ms. Swale urged the Township to forest the Fischer property to "create our own woodland". Ms. Swale also stated trees can be planted on Route 130 and can be planted on public land, Mr. Dave Mauger, 26 Griggs Road, asked if there is a requirement legally for the Turnpike to notice residents in reference to notice residents. Mr. Hanlon stated once the Plan is completed and submitted to D.E.P., the Turnpike is then required to notify the public and publish notices on the hearings. The public is urged to attend, and the plans

will be made available for them to review. Mayor Stout stated in addition, the Township can post a notice of the public hearings on its web site. Mayor Stout reported if the Township Committee agrees a request should be made to plant trees on both Petty and Plainsboro Roads. The Township Committee agreed. Mayor Stout asked the Township Committee members if they are in favor of planting 800 trees as a buffer on the Updike parcel. The Township Committee was in unanimous agreement. Mr. Cody stated he is in favor of having a community garden on the Fischer property and also planting some trees on both the Fischer and Hagerty properties. Mr. Stannard stated he is in favor of foresting Hagerty, however, raised his concern with losing the vistas on both properties and recommended planting some trees on Fischer. Mr. Cook stated he recommends planting trees fully on the Hagerty property and not reforesting completely the Fischer property. He is in favor of having a community garden. Mr. Taylor stated he is in favor of a "hybrid approach" with both properties and is in favor of having a community garden. Mayor Stout stated he believes a hybrid approach works well and a community garden is a good idea. Mayor Stout asked the Township Committee members to think about their final decision before the next meeting on February 8, 2010 at 7:00 p.m.

Reports from Township Board and Commissions

Mr. Stannard reported the Planning Board had met for the purpose of discussing the new Master Plan for next year. It is going to be expensive but is a requirement to be done every six (6) years. He reported the Planning Board is looking at combining changing the commercial district in town with this updated Master Plan.

Public Comment

The Mayor opened the meeting to public questions and comments. Mr. Dan Mulligan, Old Cranbury Road stated he is volunteering to serve on a subcommittee down the road for the community garden. He asked if the Township has a monthly fee from the Township Attorney for deeding the property to the School recently. Mayor Stout reported on the report it is listed as 4.8 hours and explained a subdivision had to be done, perfect the survey and file the deed with the County Clerk's Office. Ms. Connie Bauder, Petty Road, stated on Thursday, February 4, 2010 H1N1 flu shots are going to be given at the Plainsboro Municipal Building from 12:00 to 4:00 p.m. and asked if the Township could post this notice on its web site to "get the word out". Mr. Dave Mauger, 26 Griggs Road, stated he had attended the Cranbury Housing Associates' Open House on Sunday and it seems a lot of decisions on the Route 130-D site still need to be made as to how many affordable housing units will be built there. There being no further comments, the Mayor closed the public part of the meeting.

Mayor's Notes

Mayor Stout read a letter from State Senator Raymond Lesniak concerning his introduction of Senate Bill-1 which would allow Cranbury Township to utilize the "Regional Contribution Agreement" (RCAs) which were prohibited when A-500 was signed into law as well as restructure COAH as it is known today. Senator Lesniak also requested the Township respond to him as to its intentions concerning the RCAs. Mayor Stout suggested stating Cranbury Township has a history of doing RCAs and would like to continue to do so. Mr. Cook suggested expanding the statement stating Cranbury has a history of having RCAs for the past thirty years which has allowed Cranbury to manage its affordable housing obligations. The Township Committee members agreed, and Mayor Stout indicated he will send a letter on behalf of the Township Committee to Senator Lesniak.

Mayor Stout appointed to the Human Services Board, Catherine Frohbeiter, with a term expiring 12/31/14 and Shirley Batesdo to a term expiring 12/31/11 (filling the vacancy).

Mayor Stout stated the next appointment is a Township Committee appointment and asked if everyone agrees with this appointment. All members endorsed the appointment of Cheryl McCormack to the Municipal Alliance Commission with a term expiring 12/31/12 to fill a vacancy.
